Description of Problem: Loitering, trespassing, drug use and sales, shots fired, and disorderly activity

Phase of SARA: Response

SARA Documentation

Scanning (state problem): Fay apartment residents and council members have expressed concerns over the increase in ;oitering, drugs , shots fired and overall disorderly activity in the complex.

This has an affect on the entire Fay community and those who come to the neighborhood to visit family and friends. The management and community have worked to improve the quality of life and safety in the complex.

according to the management, the shots fired incidenst occur from 2200 hrs to 0200 in the area of 2455 and 2387 Nottingham Pl. Loitering drugs and subjects with guns frequent President drive and City View Circle and Nottingham Pl.

This has been a problem for several years, and has increased recently

Analysis (identify factual support): The analysis of the past eight months (January-August 2006), has been conducted. The information being analyzed includes calls for service, arrests, offense reports. Additionally complaints received through the District Three Violent Crimes Squad(VCS) are being reviewed to see if their enforcement effort correlates with CPOP data. We are also working with Fay Apartments management to identify tresspass violators to the area, and secure vacant aprtments

Place management practices and behavioral managemnt issues have contributed to the problem. There are a large number of female single parent households with multiple children. resident loitering and congregating in the area substantially contribute to the problem. Inhabited unsecured vacant apartments and non lease residenst staying in the area are condcuting illegal activity.

Response (define action taken): Fay management Inc. assited with information on vacant apatmenst in the area, current tresspass lits's and assistance from their police detail. Cincinnati police units from D4 power/3rd relief, VCS squad and Vortex unit.

reduce non resident subjects loitering and drug sales, and criminal activity in the area to allow the residents to feel secure in the area.

aggressive enforcement for trespassing, drug activity, weapons, and disorderly activity with a large police presence in the area.

Assessment (document measurement): Through cooperative efforts of District Three Third Relief, District Three Violent Crimes Unit, Vortex and Fay apartment community council and residents the activities targeted have been reduced greatly. Crime analysis shows a slight reduction in calls for service from July to September, 2005 to 2006. The most noticeable changes are in serious crimes such as rape and robbery, 100% reduction, aggravated robbery, 75% reduction, and discharging firearms, 83% reduction from July to September 2005 compared to the same period in 2006. This reduction in serious crime in the Fay Apartments complex is a result of increased and proactive enforcement in the area
